

Carry your medical information where ever you go

Ruth Anne and George Tyler want to let others know about this simple method of carrying your significant medical records with you. Ruth Anne has tremors which makes writing tedious and difficult, especially when you have to fill out medical forms. Now, Ruth Anne carries a thumb drive with a document containing all her medical information on a chain around her neck. This way she has a list of all her allergies, treatments and surgeries, along

with the dates and who performed them. She can also keep an up-to-date list of all her medications and dosages. Ruth Anne decided that allergies, especially to drugs or latex, should be in red. Other critical information like blood thinning medication might also be tagged red. The information is especially useful when seeing a new doctor or therapist.

To know what to include, ask for an extra copy of a blank medical history form from your doctor's office (or a copy of your personal medical history – the two page form you filled out), then use those questions to guide you as you type your own information into a file using a word processor, like Microsoft Word. You can also save it as an Adobe PDF file, which can be read by anyone who has Adobe Reader on their computer. Most doctors offices, emergency rooms and even some ambulances are equipped with computers or laptops and should be able to read the file, saving valuable time, especially in an emergency. Most memory sticks or thumb drives have plenty of storage space, so you could have one copy in Word, one in PDF and even a copy of Adobe Reader.

If you don't have the necessary computer skills, ask one of your children, nephews, nieces or grandchildren to help you with setting up and typing the information. That might be a good way to segue into a discussion of healthier live styles and illness that are hereditary. You may also get help setting up your file at the public library or a senior center.

Another tip that Ruth Anne and George want to share is to put a medical symbol on the thumb drive or memory stick. The caduceus – two intertwined snakes around a dagger or Rx would be recognized by most first responders – ambulance, police or fire. Ruth Anne chose a red memory stick to draw attention to it. George has been a member of KSPS since 1967. He is currently our chaplain, instructor and on the Executive Committee.

Surviving Cold Water Immersion: Wear Your PDF

Most people think they do not need a PFD when they are near shore. However, the fact is when the water is only 45 to 47 degrees, as is typical very early and late in the boating season in Michigan, you only have 10 minutes of meaningful movement after you fall overboard. A Coast Guard study found you have:

- 1 minute to get breathing under control
- ♦ 10 minutes of meaningful movement
- 1 hour until you become unconscious due to hypothermia

Your body's initial autonomic reaction when you hit cold water is to gasp for breath. It is difficult to coordinate your movements when you are gasping for air. You have 1 minute to get your breathing under control, then 10 minutes of meaningful movement to try to climb back on board or to get yourself out of the water. That 10 minutes is critical for the fine motor skills needed to put on a PFD, use a VFH radio to call for help or light a signal flare. After 10 minutes in water 45 to 47 degrees you will no longer be able to do very much other than tread water.

If you have your PFD on, you have about 1 hour until you slip in to unconsciousness due to hypothermia. If you do **not** have a PFD on, you will be unable to tread water or keep your head above the surface for very long.
