Are You Cleaning Your Cell Phone?

Our cell phones can not only connect us to our friends, family, and services; they can also connect us to unwanted germs. In light of concerns surrounding COVID-19, an overlooked surface that needs regular cleaning is your cell phone.

It is important to know the best ways and how often you should clean your phones.

Most phones will have a manufacturer recommendation on how to clean it best, so you may want to look at their recommendations first.

As a general rule, you want to wipe down your phone regularly. This especially applies if you have been out in public.

On Apple's website the company suggest that you can safely clean your iPhone with disinfectant wipes, like Clorox Wipes. Samsung also states that you can use an alcohol-based solution (70%) and apply it to your phone with a microfiber cloth.

While these are good suggestions to keep your phone clean there are definitely some solutions you should avoid using on your phone such as:

- 1. Pure Alcohol Straight alcohol can strip the oleophobic and hydrophobic coatings that keep oil and water from damaging your display and other ports. Instead you want to use a disinfectant wipe containing 70% isopropyl alcohol. Getting this concentration of alcohol is crucial to not damaging your phone so you should be very careful if you try to make this concentration on your own.
- 2. Hand Sanitizer while many hand sanitizers have the appropriate alcohol concentration most contain other additives such as fragrances and ethyl alcohol, both of which can damage your phone. If you have been out it is best to apply hand sanitizer to your hands before touching your phone.
- 3. Window Cleaners You may think since the surface of your phone is like glass a window cleaner should be a safe way to keep your phone clean. Window cleaners can also strip away at the protective coatings that most phones now have. These coatings are vital in protecting your phones from oil and water.
- 4. Vinegar There are countless articles around about the amazing cleaning properties of vinegar. While vinegar may be an effective way to remove dirt and grime in your home it can be extremely harmful to your cell phone. While some sites suggest you can clean the back of your phone with vinegar it's best to keep away because of accidental exposure to your phone's screen.
