- 1. Start with a blank credit card form for the first month.
- 2. To do this in Acrobat Reader go to File->Properties.
- 3. In the properties window, select the security tab located up top.
- 4. Change the security method to password security.
- 5. Password protect the document and adjust any necessary document restrictions.
- 6. Make sure you remember your password.

After completing these steps, you should be able to complete the form. Once the form is completed you can email it in. If you have any questions, please see your coordinator for assistance.

Making Safe Right Turns on Red

This year alone Washington, DC has seen nearly a 20% increase in traffic related fatalities as compared to last year. A huge factor that comes in play is the safety of cyclist and pedestrians as they cross intersections where motorist are making right turns on red. In fact, the city is considering "No Right Turn on Red' rules to help boost street safety. These rules could be enacted in the central district as well as in school zones and high accident areas.

Oddly enough, what most motorist of today do not realize is that making right turns on red was never about safety. It was proposed and enacted during the 1970's as a way to save fuel in the oil crisis. It was believed that idling at red lights, when the path was clear, would waste valuable fuel. However, there has never been much data to support the idea that this actually saves gas.



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We do however, have data that show injuries and fatalities, as a result of making right turns. With this in mind, here are some things we can do today to help make right turns on red safe for everyone.

- First you must obey the red light and come to a complete stop in the rightmost lane with your turn signal on. Make sure you stop behind the limit line or crosswalk.
- 2. Yield to oncoming traffic, motorcyclists, pedestrians, and bikers, as they have the right of away.
- 3. In heavy traffic, you may be better off waiting until you have a green light to ensure safety.
- 4. Hug the corner, however you should be mindful of bike lanes and bikers. Look over your right shoulder with your signal on, turn and make sure there are no bikers sneaking up behind you. Hug the right curb to avoid the next lane of traffic.

With this in mind, one of the most important deciding factors for consumers when choosing a device is its battery life. Here are a couple of tips to help you save on your battery consumption:

- 1. Turn on Wi-Fi which uses less power than mobile data.
- 2. Disable Bluetooth and GPS.
- 3. Leave tablets in sleep mode most of the time verse powering them off.
- 4. Disable apps that are power drainers.
- 5. Delete or disable unused apps.
- 6. Turn down your screen brightness.
- 7. Shorten screen timeout.
- 8. Disable push notifications especially for social media and email.
- 9. Disable location tracking.
- 10. Change email settings to sync less often.
- 11. Turn off auto-sync for apps that don't need it.
- 12. Turn on airplane mode when you don't need your devices.
